Reporting incidents of verbal abuse on Datix No-one should consider receiving verbal abuse to be an acceptable part of their job. It's important we know about all incidents, and in which teams/services they occur. Reporting allows us the opportunity to do something about it and reduce the risk to you, including the provision of appropriate support and training. To make reporting of verbal abuse events easier, a simple tally system has been developed as an option for doing this. Managers of areas where verbal abuse may be an issue should offer this option to their team for recording such incidents. The incidents can then be tallied up and reported in one Datix. Please note, low level verbal abuse is the **only** type of abuse which should be reported in this way. All other incidents require separate Datix reports.

Update to the National Infection Prevention and Control Manual (NIPCM) regarding the management of Mpox (previously known as Monkey Pox) Following recent statements from the World Health Organisation regarding the current outbreak of Clade 1 Mpox, the National Infection Prevention and Control Manual case definition for Mpox has been updated. This is now classed as a high consequence infectious disease (HCID). A table of PPE required for the management of cases of HCID has been included within the guidance and a link to the NES donning and doffing video for HCID. This link takes you directly to the Mpox guidance for healthcare settings.

PACS/RIS downtime – this Thursday An essential IT upgrade will take place this Thursday (22 August) at 12.30, lasting approximately 20 minutes. During this time, the Radiology VLAN will be unavailable, along with PACS and RIS. Modalities will be unable to send or receive information from these systems. Users should be aware of the following:

• PACS users will not be able to view imaging from the client (Web and Desktop).

- Modalities will not be able to send imaging to the PACS archive during this window imaging should be manually sent once the connection is available once more.
- Modalities will not have access to worklists during this window in preparation all departments should have a excel or paper copy of their worklists at hand to ensure that have access to this information during the maintenance window.
- The Soliton Radiology+ Reporting Platform will be unavailable. Please ensure all reporting is saved prior to the 12:30 network shutdown or changes may not be saved to the system.
- RIS will be completely unavailable during this time. RIS functions should be noted down and entered on the system once it returns.
