Service update – Domestic & Support Services At present, due to high levels of staff absence, the domestic & support services team are prioritising high-risk clinical areas. This means low-risk, nonclinical areas may not receive the usual frequency of cleaning. Please be assured the team works as a collective group to prioritise areas and reallocate staff, and we appreciate your support and understanding. You can help us focus on the task at hand by refraining from multiple queries to the supervisors on lack of domestic staff in areas. Regrettably, if you work in a non-clinical area your domestic service will be very limited at present. We apologise for any inconvenience.

Infection Prevention and Control Turas landing page The Infection Prevention and Control (IPC) team have <u>developed a dedicated landing page on Turas</u> relating to the Scottish Infection Prevention and Control Education Pathway (SIPCEP) and local mandatory IPC training.

This page details where the IPC modules can be found, signposts you to helpful documents, links to related pages on Turas, and specifies IPC training that should be done either every year or every two years. There is also sub-page with other training bookable via <u>gram.infectioncontrol@nhs.scot</u> and delivered by your local IPC Nurse.

Whooping Cough (Bordetella pertussis) – what you need to know We have experienced a sharp rise in cases of whooping cough locally (and across Scotland) since December 2023. Sometimes known as the 100-day cough, whooping cough is highly contagious until three weeks after the onset of cough, or 48 hours of appropriate antibiotic treatment. Up to 90% of household contacts will acquire the infection. The cough increases in frequency and severity over time. Intense, uncontrollable, coughing fits can lead to vomiting. People may make an audible 'whoop' when they cough or have a bluish tinge to the skin, lips, or nail beds.

Unimmunised infants are the group most vulnerable to severe complications including pneumonia, seizures, encephalitis, or death. Neonates can be protected by maternal antibodies and infants by immunisation, hence the importance of vaccination in pregnancy and infancy. Protection from vaccination or past infection is not lifelong, but vaccinated individuals tend to have a milder illness. Vaccination is also recommended for healthcare workers who have regular contact with young infants and those in the final stages of pregnancy
