

Nature Far Ye Bide in schools - Co-creating Local Plans for Nature



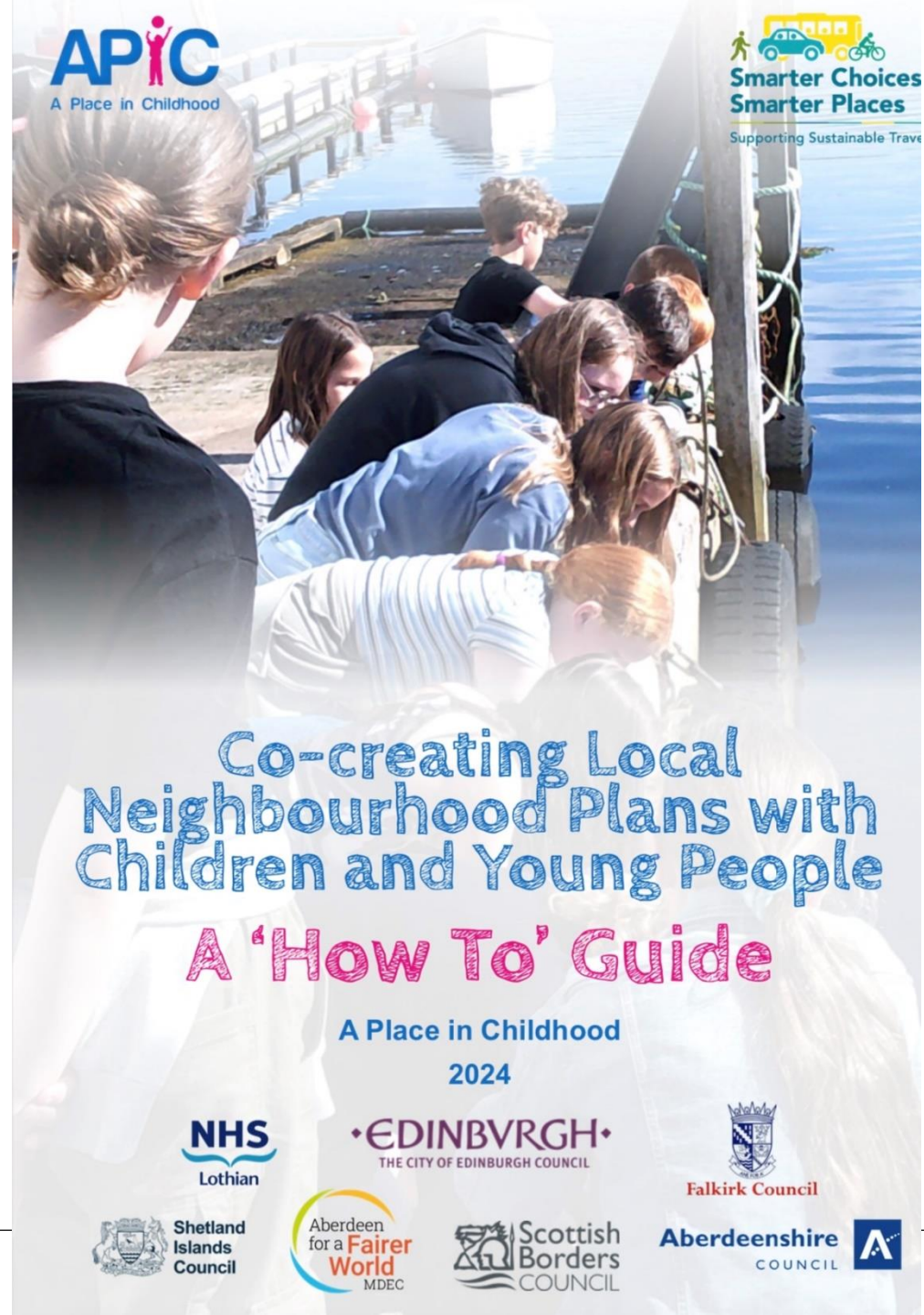
Project Objectives

How..

Empowering pupils, giving them a voice to talk about nature in their school, neighbourhood and town- seeing their community through their experiences.

Using Experiential Mapping and photos, collaging, art, poetry, stories

Gathering with other schools to share their priorities for action.

And then..



- Pupils present a community and stakeholder event- sharing their feelings, ideas and their identified priorities.
- Information will also be available for community members, from a variety of organisations who are interested in forming a group to take on the care of an area of land, which the young people have identified, and they feel comfortable to manage.



If we choose not to engage children and young people in their local places, we turn a blind eye to the ways local living environments shape childhood in ways we may or may not intend, and we shut down our own access to key information on how spaces and places we live and work in could be better.
