- 60 year old woman presented in bed with back pain and shortness of breath.
- Secondary cancer diagnosis no services and no contact with practice for many years.
- Carer for grandchildren 12 and 8 who had been nursing her at home.
- No other supportive family and complex family dynamic
- End of life care in Care Home children placed into foster care out with Grampian.

Being Human

We changed our approach to shared decision making and adopted a multidisciplinary approach that was reactive and focused.



We built a personalised approach to care that enabled engagement and ultimately changed the outcomes for this family.


